1 | A neutral greyish blue colour scheme provides contrast for the white and cream furnishings. Easy to install foam crown moulding adds architectural detail. Sico Country Road 6204-41, sico.ca. Moulding, cana mould.com.


2 | A down-filled sectional sofa in a durable cream linen-polyester offers the same amount of seating as two sofas with the added bonus of a double sofa bed. 3 | There were some pieces I couldn't part with: a pine pedestal table and an antique piecrust tea table. They're the perfect size and height for use as end tables and add a personal touch that complements the new pared-down contemporary style of the room. 4 | After painting the walls and moulding, I repainted the red coffee table in a durable semigloss cream to match the sofa. An old wooden tray corrals accessories, books and television remotes. 5 A longtime dream of mine has been to have a library wall for all of my books and collectibles. The Liatorp wall system from Ikea perfectly suits my traditional style and works well with my antiques. By combining coordinating pieces in the collection, I was able to cover almost the entire 11-foot wall. Adding doors to the bottom of the two bookcases gives me storage for odds and ends, and creates a more built-in look to the unit. 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- 6 | An old painted pine table was replaced with a round pedestal table, so that more people could sit comfortably without having table legs to contend with. Upholstered chairs offer a more relaxing dining experience. A china cabinet with space-saving sliding glass doors, interior lights and four drawers on the bottom provides plenty of storage and display for a tight space. - 8 | Patterned Ripplefold-style floor-length sheer curtains are hung on a simple track system that's installed in the ceiling and barely visible. It's an inexpensive alternative to costly rods, and the curtains snap on for easy installation and removal. Today's modern sheers offer privacy without blocking the light and view.
